MEMBERS ENJOY THE NEW HOUSE AS BETA-CHI CELEBRATES 110 YEARS

ALUMNI OUTLINE NECESSARY UPGRADES TO ACCOMPLISH IN THE COMING YEARS

This year marks the 110th year of the Beta-Chi Chapter of Kappa Sigma. We will celebrate our anniversary on Saturday, October 19, during Homecoming. If you have not seen the new house, Homecoming is a great opportunity to reconnect with your brothers and see what we have accomplished.

The Beta-Chi Chapter House is the 11th largest fraternity house in the country, the second largest fraternity house (by a few hundred square feet) at Rolla, and the second largest Kappa Sigma house in the country. It is 28,500 square feet and houses 96 men; it is truly a gem. It is not only big, but is also beautiful and built to withstand the rigors of fraternity living. Additionally, the undergraduate Chapter is proving themselves to be worthy stewards of such an impressive Chapter House. The undergraduates are an enthusiastic and motivated group and have been excelling in academics, athletics and campus-wide competitions like Greek Week and St. Pats. They have a chapter GPA above the all-men's average and 16 members have a 4.0. Kappa Sigma has been first or second in recruitment the last several years, and there are more than 100 active members. I am proud of our Chapter and what we have accomplished. We are truly the pride of Rolla, and representatives from Kappa Sigma national have consistently pointed to Beta-Chi as an example for other chapters to emulate.

Although we spent over \$4 million on the new house, there were some projects our budget did not allow us to complete that we hope to soon:

- 1. We need to expand the irrigation system. Rolla has been in a two-year drought and it has been difficult to get anything to grow. Watering two acres by hand when most of the members are gone over the summer has not been successful. Additionally, now that construction is finished and the water drainage patterns are known, some additional trench drains need to be installed.
- 2. Install the Kappa Sigma letters and the crest on the house, modeled after the signage on the International Memorial Headquarters of Kappa Sigma in Charlottesville, Virginia.
- Our electrical service is original and will need to be replaced soon.

- 4. Upgrades to the Chapter House's Internet have proven necessary.
- We are investigating replacing the original sand volleyball court with a sports court where you could play tennis, volleyball, basketball, or roller hockey.
- 6. To finance the construction costs that were not covered by donations, we have a 20-year loan that we would like to pay off early to save on interest payments.

There are two educational foundations that provide scholarships to Beta-Chis who excel academically. The Kappa Sigma Endowed Educational Fund is managed by the university, and the Beta-Chi Educational Foundation is managed by Beta-Chi alumni. If you give to the university you can specify our foundation so Beta-Chis will benefit. Both are tax deductible and directly benefit worthy undergraduate members of the Chapter. Members Have Success in Recruitment, Greek Events, and Academics

The Beta-Chi undergraduates experienced post-renovation success into the spring

2013 school year. This semester brought us great achievement in all areas of fraternal life, including academics, brotherhood, and campus involvement.

We have a spring pledge class of two men that followed an impressive 27-man class in the fall. Recruitment Chairman Ross Hoover '11 emphasized the importance of recruitment within the organization and

has already handed out multiple bid cards to qualified young men for fall 2013.

Internally, we have experienced great success in brotherhood improvement. In the fall, Beta-Chi took second place behind Pi Kappa Alpha in the 50th annual Greek Week by less than 10 points. We competed in the 105th St. Pats celebration to ensure the first place trophy stays in the Chapter House foyer.

In early February, Beta-Chi had the privilege to hold a special initiation for Urban R. Cartier, a pledge from the 1948 class, who was forced to leave school for financial reasons before his initiation. It was truly

Alumnus Rekindles Ties to Kappa Sigma

en Staab '76 lives by the motto "do what makes sense and what feels right." The bonds he felt with the active brothers during recruitment gave him the sense that Kappa Sigma was the right place for him. "Just being associated with a great group of people and living with them, I was proud of all the things we accomplished collectively."

Ken graduated with a degree in civil engineering. A job opportunity with Exxon allowed him to move to west Texas. After working there for a couple of years, he then joined a start-up company as an engineer in 1985 called XTO Energy. The company began with seven people and grew into the largest natural gas producer in the United States. "I was fortunate as a young engineer to be offered the opportunity to work with the company." In 2009, the company was sold to Exxon. Ken stayed on for three more years, working as the senior vice president before his retirement. In his retirement, Ken is a part owner in a classic car dealership, Hardway Classic Cars.

He appreciates the life lessons he learned in Kappa Sigma and acknowledges that the fraternity played an important role in his career success. "It taught me the ability to work with people, create goals and priorities, and how to blend them together to have a successful organization."

Ken's advice to undergraduates is to find a balance between the academics and social experiences. "Make your studies a priority and find a balance so you can attend every party, float trip, and activity. You usually know when those activities are happening, so you can plan your studies around them. It gives you the best college experience and teaches good time management."

Admittedly, Ken has not stayed close to the Chapter since graduating, but not by intention. He says the natural progression of everyone spreading out after graduation and him moving to Texas contributed over time to the distance with the Chapter. He has kept up with brothers sporadically and says they always pick up where they left off and the bond remains as if they still saw each other every day. Recently he has reconnected with <code>Ed Jantosik</code> '76, and he is hoping to help plan the golf trip and return to the campus this summer.

BARRY SHELDEN '78 SHARES HOW KAPPA SIGMA HELPED HIS CAREER PATH



Barry Shelden '78 decided to join a fraternity with a friend from high school. He says he chose Kappa Sigma because of the quick friendships he made with his pledge brothers. "We had a lot of brothers in

leadership positions in campus organizations, and we had the best parties, hands down!"

Barry earned a bachelor's degree in petroleum engineering, while serving as the Beta-Chi assistant treasurer, treasurer, and GM. He has been in the oil and gas business since graduation. He is the business unit manager for Noble Energy's Appalachia Business Unit, where he develops Marcellus Shale (natural gas) in Pennsylvania and West Virginia. Through his career Barry has lived in Alaska and overseas for 24 of the last 32 years.

Barry recalls graduate student Larry Peck '72, who lived in the house while he was a pledge. "Larry took on a project that required every pledge to prepare a resume. This was back in the days before PCs were invented, so we had to type them. Larry was a real stickler, and we had to retype them several times. At the time, we were not happy with him for making us do this; however, when my resume was completed,

Larry suggested that I turn my resume in at the placement center for a summer job with Amoco. I was an undecided engineering major at the time, but I got the job offer from Amoco Production Company. After I got that job, I declared my major in petroleum engineering."

He also appreciates the help he received from the Kappa Sigma faculty advisor, **Lenn Koederitz '64**, who was the head of the petroleum engineering department at the time. "He was my advisor, and he was tough on the Kappa Sigs (he didn't want to show favoritism), but he was a great professor and teacher, and he really had a tremendous impact on my career path."

Barry's advice for the undergraduates is the same advice he gave to his three daughters when they went off to college: go to class. "No matter what, go to class! No matter how late I stayed up, I almost always made it to class. I remember going over to the Chi Omega house at six in the morning for a breakfast party. It was fun, but I still made it to my eight o'clock class."

In addition, he says it is important to get involved and study. "Get involved, both in Kappa Sigma and in campus organizations. This really helped me when I was interviewing for jobs, and I know it is still important today with recruiters. The forced study hours when we were

freshmen was the best thing ever. I don't know if I would have made the transition from high school without this. After I was initiated, I kept up with these hours and it paid off. I learned how to study more efficiently as the years went on, so I was able to have plenty of fun."

Barry says, along with the career success he has experienced, Beta-Chi helped him become who he is today. "As pledges, there were several sophomores who were tough on the freshmen. This taught me that you may not always like your boss, but you have to learn to make the best of a bad situation. As GM and treasurer, I had to make some decisions that may not have been popular, but they were the right thing to do. I learned the value of diversity. We had a lot of different types of guys in the house; however, we all came together in Kappa Sigma and each person was able to make a great contribution. Finally, the friendships I made in Kappa Sigma have been lifelong. Even though I've been out of touch for several years, my Kappa Sigma brothers have always supported me."

Barry has stayed close with his pledge brothers. When he moved to Alaska four Beta-Chis were also living there: **Gerry Suellentrop '78**, **Steve Suellentrop '71**, **Mark Drumm '74**, and **Andy Simon '71**. "We did a lot together and had a (Continued on page 4)
