Last year we spent over \$100,000 on repairs and have typically spent \$60,000. Doors and lock repair/replacements caused most of the increase. The wiring and conduit are encased in the concrete floors, and every year more wires break. Most of the wires cannot be pulled in the existing conduit and require surface mounted conduit. The plumbing is mostly underground, causing costly repairs and a real mess. The kitchen still has the original dishwasher that requires several repairs each year. The repair list goes on and on, and rent was dramatically increased to offset the cost for the repairs.

We continue to battle competition from other recently renovated fraternity houses and university housing. These stateof-the-art facilities reflect the dated architecture of our house. Coupled with the individual bathrooms and suitestyle living (shared living room with two bedrooms), our group showers and shared bedrooms are not as appealing since most college-bound students come from homes where they had private bedrooms and bathrooms. Although we remain a top fraternity on campus, for us to carry on the legacy of Kappa Sigma, we must invest in our future.

We all contributed to the wear and tear on the house and, after 40 years, it is worn out. The bones of the house are good because the concrete floors and block walls are indestructible, but we must update and provide a facility that meets the needs of today and tomorrow's Kappa Sigs. Over the next year we will be working on a plan to transform the house and we will be asking for your help. It is time for all of us to give back to the thing that gave so much to us.

Hall of Fame Inductee Tom Gresham '59


rowing up as an only child in Carthage, Missouri, Tom Gresham '59 would never have experienced the bonds of brotherhood if it weren't for Kappa Sigma. The "sharing, caring, borrowing, and giving some of life's greatest treasures" was the most important aspect of Tom's fraternity experience. Furthermore, Kappa Sigma helped Tom evaluate himself and his experiences to see his potential and possibilities for the future.

In addition to the profound impact Kappa Sigma made on Tom, the lighter moments are just as vivid and special. Some of his favorites include party weekends, fellowship, all-night bridge games, and joining together to get big things done.

In 1969, Ted took over his father's jointly owned investments and merged with a New York company, creating Varlen Corporation. In less than 30 years, Varlen has hit \$1 billion in sales. After adding several other successful ventures to his portfolio, Ted has been allocating personal funds since 1970 to help financially deprived students get a college education. Ted is an active

member of the Beta-Chi House Corporation and is the driving force behind the renovation/expansion of the Chapter House.

Gary Forsee '69 has been chosen by the National Fraternity as the 2009 Kappa Sigma Fraternity Man of the Year. He is the 22nd president of the University of Missouri system, which has campuses in Columbia, Kansas City, Rolla, and St. Louis. Prior to his February 2008 appointment as president, Gary spent more than 36 years in the telecommunications industry, serving as chairman and CEO of Sprint Nextel, CEO of Global One, Deutsche Telekom, and France Telecom, and in various leadership positions at AT&T and Southwestern Bell. He has received numerous honors, including the Henry Bloch Humanitarian

Award, the American Red Cross Circle of Humanitarian Award, and Business Week's Best Manager Award in 2004 and 2005.

The Man of the Year banquet will be held Saturday February 20, 2010 in Rolla. The event will be attended by the entire Kappa Sigma executive board, University officials, and hundreds of alumni and undergraduates. ## Alumnus Remembers Entrepreneurial Pledge Brother

ne of my pledge Brothers, Charles Peter Becker Jr. '60, passed away last November after a very tough fight with cancer

and other complications for a year and a half. There's an interesting story here which I would like to tell you.

Charlie, aka "The Chopper," was working as an assistant plant manager in an ITT non-ferrous foundry and becoming dissatisfied with employment. Charlie decided to go

into business for himself. At that point he was probably earning about \$100,000 per year in present-day dollars. ITT huddled and offered to double his salary if he would stay. Charlie declined the offer, purchased a garden tiller and put an ad in the newspaper which read, "Call me, Charlie Becker, and I will come to your home and establish a vegetable garden in your backyard." The Chopper picked up some garden jobs and then one customer needed a fireplace. So Charlie, knowing full well how to spell fireplace, got into the fireplace business. That led to fireplace inserts, which led to fireplace doors.

> Now The Chopper needed hydraulic presses but didn't have the money to purchase it. So working his usual 12/6 schedule he built probably 40 or 50 hydraulic presses to fabricate metal to make the best-looking fireplace doors on the market. And as you might suspect, that led to the hydraulic press business.

Beckwood Press Company now builds multithousand-ton capacity custom presses, often as tall as a two-story house and with multiple hydraulic cylinder as big as tree trunks. And it all began with many years ago with "Call me, Charlie Becker, and I will come to your home and establish a vegetable garden in your backyard." An amazing run. I will never forget him.
