Beta-Chi Offers Scholarships

Congratulations to Beta-Chi for winning the Founder's Award for Chapter Excellence for the second year in a row. This is the highest honor given by the Kappa Sigma Fraternity.

The pandemic has created challenges for the Fraternity and its undergraduate members. One of those challenges is the increase in students with financial needs. This semester, the Beta-Chi Educational Foundation is delivering 13 financial aid scholarships, totaling \$22,500, to both actives and pledges. I want to thank our generous alumni for their support of these scholarships. Some of the funds came from Missouri S&T matching funds. This year, Missouri S&T stopped providing internet services, so we acquired and installed new equipment and hired a local provider. We also hard-wired the entire house. Thanks again to the Beta-Chi Educational Foundation for funding this effort.

The university recently built several new dorms but did not hit its enrollment goals. As a result, they had empty dorm rooms. MS&T then imposed dorm cancellation fees on Greeks, imposed new Greek fees, and stopped providing critical recruiting data. These changes have hurt our ability to recruit. We are working with the university and other Greek organizations to improve our ability to recruit. Please let us know of any students heading to MS&T.

We're looking forward to a great year at the Beta-Chi Chapter of Kappa Sigma! Please let us know if you need help organizing a class reunion. I hope you and your family stay healthy and safe.

Beta-Chi Brothers Participate in Social Activities Once Again

This past spring semester was a promising look into Beta-Chi's future. Our members had plenty of fun via our weekend tournaments and valuable life lessons via our membership development committees. From our pool tournament to teaching members how to change a tire, we successfully provided everyone with ways to get involved in a positive fashion. It was amazing to hear members laughing and conversing throughout the hallways once again. With the newly elected executive committee and committee heads, the promise for continued growth in a positive direction is vibrant. These leaders have seen the Chapter through unprecedented times and are ready to put forth the effort necessary to ensure the betterment of our members.

Lessons and How He
Supports the Brotherhood*



Steve Malcolm '67 arrived at Missouri S&T knowing two things: he wanted to get an engineering degree and play basketball. He played throughout high school with his friend, **Duane Vaughan '67**, and thought it would be fun to continue in college. While the basketball dream didn't happen, Kappa Sigma did instead, and the opportunity had a positive impact on Steve's college life, bringing him many fond memories to look back on.

"Most of my favorite Kappa Sig memories are tied to my years living at the house on State Street, including learning to play bridge in the card room, exciting poker games in the basement, and trying to drown out the noises from 30 other Brothers all trying to get some shut eye on the sleeping porch," Steve said.

Steve's Kappa Sigma Brothers were always there for him during college. He was always able to find a Brother to talk him through a physics problem or help him prepare for a test (that he had procrastinated studying for yet again). He looks back with pride on the Kappa Sigma experience where he learned so much.

"The Fraternity taught us about being respectful, compassionate, humble, and polite. Pledges also learned the importance of cooperation as we worked together to develop a positive sense of camaraderie and worked as a team toward a common goal—these traits were helpful later in the business world," Steve said.

Steve worked most of his career in the energy industry, starting with Cities Service Company

In 2002, Steve was elected chairman of the board and CEO, retiring from the company in early 2011.

Kappa Sigma always encouraged its Brothers to support the school and local community by volunteering to assist various service organizations and charities. Steve took this to heart when he joined Williams, which had "giving back to the community" as one of its core values and beliefs. During his tenure at Williams, he served on many local boards (sometimes as chairman), such as United Way, YMCA (local and national), OCCJ, and Tulsa University Board of Trustees.

Steve continues to give back to the community through his support of Beta-Chi with the Scholastic Scholarship Program. He finds it rewarding to help those who need assistance so they can continue to thrive in the Fraternity.

"I don't believe we had anything like that back when I was in school. I remember some people fell behind on paying their house bills, and I always felt sad that they were faced with that situation," Steve said. "I think it's money well

spent to help those who need a few dollars to help them get through their time at school."

Steve believes it is important for undergraduates to apply themselves and work hard. "There are a lot of good life lessons that one can get from their time in Kappa Sig; try to absorb those the best you can and give back to your community and school."
